find it very challenging to deal with God's love. In some ways, it's very easy. It's easy to see the beauty of creation, the delicacy of flowers, the innocence and overwhelming joy of children. Seeing relationships of others is moving and rewarding. It's wonderful to reflect on days of courtship, early marriage, and the building of a family.

God's love is so evident in the life of the church. To see "love in one delightful stream" flow among Christians is a rich blessing. Sometimes when we share in our small groups, or in table fellowship when we just reflect on God

and explore one another, God's love is clear and feels very present.

Camp life has always been a high point for me in experiencing the love of God. The power of the Spirit in a campfire with beautiful songs of worship is one of the transcendent love experiences of my life. I see the delight of young people and staff for one another and a thousand memories rush in of laughter, of debate, of deeper striving to know God.



I think of mentors of my youth, of comrades with whom I have worked to make God seem more real to thousands of young people. Names flood my mind: Don, Aaron, Frank, Bobby, Jerry, Hugh, J. L. Each one calls to mind great joy in the fellowship of ministry in Christian camping.

Work in Christian child care has been rich in its gifts of love and of showing how God loves. How amazing to see Him call young people with no knowledge of Him to an understanding of His presence, power and grace.

Bobbye and I have been blessed not only with our own children, but with families – children and grandchildren –

who have come to us through our fellowship and partnership at places like Shults-Lewis and Potter Children's Home. The moments of teaching, of sharing, of tears and of great fun remind me of the endless resources of God's love.

But I had said God's love is a challenge to me. It is. I struggle to be able to summon the sweet affection and the filling of my emotional senses with the kind of complete and unrestrained love which He deserves. It's not easy for me. I have often thought and said that the greatest commandment is surely the hardest: to love the Lord with all my heart, soul, mind and strength.

How quickly, for me, high moments of worship and deep feelings of gratitude for His endless gifts to me can fade into self-absorption and pettiness. I love the sentiment of the song "Higher Ground." I want to live there. I just find it very difficult because of the weakness of my resolve.

I think part of my struggle is simply believing that God can really love me. We have talked about it many

times. We look at wonderful texts like that one in **Psalm 103** that reminds us that He removes our sins as far as the east is from the west and that his love is as high as the heavens.

I know it is true.

I cling to the promise of His grace.

I look forward with deep yearning for that time when I will be able to love Him as His beauty and goodness deserve.

I am thankful to all of you for the many ways you remind me of and give me the experience of knowing the sweet love of God.




