he greatest memorial of a people is to remember God. When the foundation stone of a people is gone, all other anchors are futile.

I must admit that our military might is impressive. Today, we give thanks to those who have made great sacrifices to preserve, defend and protect this land. I enjoy seeing the machines of power made for war. I went to see the movie "Act of Valor," and the technology was amazing. This power of arms tempts us to a feeling of security. But we know better,

don't we!

The psalmist wrote, ¹⁰ His pleasure is not in the strength of the horse, nor his delight in the legs of a man;

the LORD delights in those who fear him, who put their hope in his unfailing love. *Psalms* 147:10-11 (NIV)

Those who he in the LOKD will renew their STRENGTI they will SOAR wings like AGLES

—Isaiah 40:31

In our day, we would invoke the brave men in select units, like the Navy Seals, or we might mention our favorite weapons systems.

But the only security a nation can enjoy is the security of godliness. That's why the familiar passage in the psalms comes to mind on our Memorial Day:

"Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord." *Psalm* 33:12

As decades go by, the place of faith and reverence for God in the public arena is growing more and more faint. In our day, great, persistent prayer is the most desperate need of our land.

When Zerubbabel faced the daunting task of rebuilding the temple, Zechariah strengthened him with this powerful reminder: ⁶ Then he said to me, "This is the word of the LORD to Zerub'babel: Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, says the LORD of hosts. *Zechariah 4:6* (*RSV*)

It is sad that most in our land, it seems, do not have any practical belief in this claim that God's Spirit still rules in the world of nations and world leaders.

Only those who know God through the answer to prayers, through the

understanding of scriptures, and through the inward presence of the Holy Spirit truly know how to wait upon, to hope in the Lord.

As we give thanks for a land of peace and freedom, remember the only memorial which will stand is to remember God.



As the weather continues to get warmer, Memorial Day weekend is almost here and the summer break is not really that far away, we are all beginning to think about and plan our summer activities.

Just this past weekend, I spent over \$100 on flowers for the front yard (Happy Mother's Day, Carrie) and over \$45 on a bike air pump, bee killer spray, mosquito fogger spray and a citronella candle for the backyard deck and this really cool nozzle for the hose to water those new flowers!

This is also the time of year when many of us are working to open RCC and prepare the camp for the upcoming retreats and summer camp sessions.

Just like those various things I bought to get my house and yard ready for summer, RCC has several maintenance and facility needs to get ready to open the camp. RCC needs things like new water heaters so we can have hot showers in the bathhouse, replacing and repairing the fireplace brick in the mess hall so we can use the fireplace on those cool evenings, an intercom system in all the cabins so we can communicate with everyone during summer thunderstorms and when it is time for a meal or the next activity (it is difficult to hear the megaphone in the new insulated, heated/air-conditioned cabins...ask anyone from Cabin 2 who was late to breakfast or a campfire), an ice dispenser, soccer nets, replacement canteen window, replacement cabin windows/screens, and of course, the list could go on and on...In all, the RCC board estimates that we need to raise at least \$10,000 to get the camp facility ready and fully functional for the summer camp sessions...we could really use your help!
